U.S. Route 101 in San Benito County



Purpose of this Transportation Planning Fact Sheet:

Transportation Planning Fact Sheets provide one comprehensive interactive summary document that captures physical, social, political, and development characteristics along State Routes and provides web links to various planning resources and documents. Fact sheets are to be used as supplemental planning documents to Caltrans Transportation Concept Reports (TCRs).

Route Description:

- Within Caltrans District 5, Route 101 accommodates significant amounts of interregional traffic, including commercial and agricultural trucking, tourist, and business traffic. Goods movement along this corridor is important to the economic vitality of the State. Route 101 in San Benito County (SBt Co.) is primarily used for trips originating and/or ending outside of the County.
 - ❖ Route 101 segment in SBt Co. includes junctions with State Routes 156 East and 129.
- Total Length: 269 miles through four counties in Caltrans District 5: Santa Barbara, San Luis Obispo, Monterey and San Benito (7.41 miles in San Benito County).
- The U.S. Route 101 Transportation Concept Report (TCR) divides U.S. Route 101 into 12 segments, one of them located in San Benito Co. (segment 12) – see map below
- Type of facility: 4-5 lane rural expressway and rural freeway
- Functional Classification: Rural Principal Arterial
- Terrain: Rolling
- Truck Traffic: 15 to 16 % (2005)






➤ **TCR recommended Action:** widen facility to 6-lanes in concert with facility widening or bypass construction in Monterey County

County Profile:

- [San Benito County](#) consists of two incorporated cities: [Hollister](#) and [San Juan Bautista](#) (web links connect to City/County General Plan)
- SBt County: 45% growth between 1990 to 2000, from 36,697 to 53,234 (3.8% per year)
 - 51.5% projected growth between 2000 to 2020, from 53,234 to 80,653



- **35.3%** of San Benito County residents speak Spanish as their first language.
- San Benito is a unique rural county surrounded by the more urban counties of Santa Clara, Santa Cruz, and Monterey. 1990's growth in Santa Clara County created tremendous pressure for residential growth in San Benito County, where housing costs are significantly lower. This has dramatically increased demands on the regional transportation system.
- Although there are limited facilities for bicyclists in San Benito County, in 2001 the Council of San Benito County Governments adopted a [Bikeway and Master Plan](#).

Public Transportation:

[San Benito County Express](#) provides fixed route service in the city of Hollister, and intercity service in the northern portion of the county. Service operates as far north as [Gilroy](#), in [Santa Clara County](#).

Commuter Rail Service:

Commuter rail service to Santa Clara County and points north is available in Gilroy (Santa Clara Co.). A feasibility analysis of commuter rail in San Benito County was completed in 2000 and included cost estimates that were far outside of available and projected funding and low ridership projections. As of 2005, the Council of San Benito County Governments was not actively pursuing a rail project but included the project in its long-term project list.

TCR General Recommendations:

- *Widen facility to 6 lanes in concert with facility widening or bypass construction in Monterey County*
- *Ensure any improvements to the facility will accommodate a future 6-lane facility*
- Implement Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) components from Central Coast Deployment Plan
- Reduce demand by encouraging and improving alternative modes such as passenger rail, transit, vanpools, and ridesharing (Extend Caltrain service from Gilroy to Salinas and to Hollister)

Regional Planning Issues:

- Region is mostly rural, with communities like San Juan Bautista aiming for minimal growth in the future
- Increasing level of commuter traffic between the three counties (San Benito, Monterey, and Santa Clara)

Trucking:

San Benito County experiences a higher than average amount of truck traffic. This activity, while largely confined to state highways, impacts local streets and rural roads not designed to handle large, heavy trucks. Trucking activity around and through San Juan Bautista is a particular problem, with Hollister experiencing the same problem to a lesser degree. Commodity exports from San Benito County are primarily agricultural products and quarry materials. Transport of these products generates a significant amount of truck traffic in and out of the County. Stores import nearly all items that are sold in San Benito County.

Caltrans District 5 - System Analysis Study of Routes 101, 156 and 152: Purpose of the study is to clarify the roles of the State Routes within the regional system, identify east-west capacity needs in the study area, enhance the Santa Clara Valley Transportation Authority's Southern Gateway Study, and help determine sampling and validation for the planned San Benito/Santa Clara Interregional Study.

Southern Gateway Transportation and Land Use Study: Purpose of the study is to identify roadway improvements that meet the transportation needs of the Southern Gateway study area (major corridors leading to and from Santa Clara County and the Silicon Valley) based on projected growth of population, housing and jobs for the area. The roadway improvements in the study area are presented while taking into consideration transportation funding constraints, land use policies and transportation funding priorities for the area.
